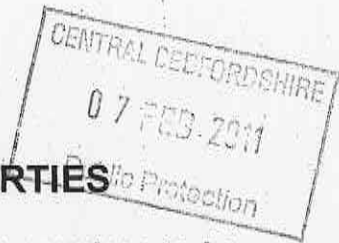

There is also bound to be fighting. It is impossible to see that there is any need or justification for any of this.

My children, whose bedrooms are on the street itself directly over the pavement, are no longer wakened by the hollering of drunks in the middle of the night at weekends. Other children in the street are, I think, likely to be at risk of being similarly affected.
