Comment: Serious acquisitive crime (SAC) includes domestic burglary, robbery, theft of motor vehicle and theft from motor vehicle. Reducing SAC remains as a p term reduction plans are being developed with Community Safety Partnership (CSP) partners and town councils to make further progress.

Along with the CSP, the Council's Community Safety, Housing and Child Protection teams are working hard on the Integrated Offender Management programme. reoffending by offering them help and support.
