		<p>Final 2014 results show that 57.1% of young people achieved 5 or more A* - C grades at GCSE or equivalent including English and Maths. Whilst this is a decrease of 0.6% compared to last year there has been improvement as Central Bedfordshire has gone up 42 places in the ranking of English local authorities (from 114/151 in 2013 to 72/151 in 2014). The England Average was 53.4%. The highest average within our statistical neighbours group is 61.5% and the lowest is 54.0%. The statistical neighbour average was 58.0%. Within this grouping Central Bedfordshire is ranked 7 out of 11, an improvement of 3 places.</p> <p>Two LA maintained schools received direct support and challenge through the School Intervention Strategy in 2013/14. Student progress data to date in 1 school demonstrated that the actions taken by this school had a positive impact on improved outcomes in 2014. 	Comment	<p>The target continues to reduce reflecting the national aspiration for shorter adoption timescales. Our average time has increased due to adoptions taking place after extended intervals that were very much in the best interests of the child and family. Despite this increase, timeliness of adoption in Central Bedfordshire has remained better than our Statistical Neighbour average. There are a number of adoption order applications in process, and these are expected to lead to adoptions in the near future, which will have a positive impact on this indicator. However, the new Court of Appeal Guidance in Adoption cases has led to birth parents responses being considered in more detail and delays impact on this measure too.</p> <p>Our performance close to the threshold demonstrates that children are placed in their permanent home without undue delay which is particularly important in enabling very young children to form positive emotional attachments.</p> <p>This indicator was introduced by the Department for Education (DfE) based on a rolling 3 year cohort. Targets are set nationally by the DfE. Because this is a rolling 3 year average the figure includes activity from previous years.</p>

	Comment	<p>Data relates to the incidence of domestic abuse (either currently or historically within the family context) included by the Conference Chair in their summary of concerns. As such domestic abuse is not the only, nor necessarily the precipitating factor leading to the child becoming subject to a child protection plan on a second or subsequent occasion. Therefore the data needs to be treated with caution in respect of demonstrating performance in relation to the success of interventions.</p> <p>This quarter's incidence is high and off target, but it should be noted that low numbers do lead to greater fluctuation in percentages.</p> <p>The annual figure is 68% - just missing the 14/15 target . This is an increase of 2% from last year.</p> <p>All children made subject to repeat plans are audited by team manager and chair.</p> <p>The Council is currently developing a Strategy for domestic abuse that will help to further improve its response to domestic abuse issues faced by children and adults alike. Payment By Results (PBR) claims were subject to an annual external audit, the outcome of which was very positive. Due to a very strong return, no further action was required.</p> <p>The second (Expanded) phase of the programme started in April 2015. Central Bedfordshire Council has been set a target of identifying and turning around 1090 families over the next five years. CBC has signed up to make <i>significant and sustained progress</i> with 150 families in the first year (2015/16). The first PBR claims are likely to be in January 2016 (due to evidencing intervals relating to sustained progress). The claim windows have reduced to two per annum.</p> <p>A team of nine Family Partners has been recruited and HR are working through the reference / DBS processes. An Employment Advisor is on an initial 12 month secondment from the Department for Work and Pensions (DWP) to work alongside the Supporting Families team in identifying barriers to work and to support claimants to make progress towards continuous employment.</p>

	Comment	<p>Data for this indicator is reported nationally at CCG level so locally, data for Central Bedfordshire resident deliveries at individual hospital trusts is monitored and reported, with a particular focus on reducing the rates of smoking at the time of delivery at the L&D – where rates are significantly higher for Central Bedfordshire mothers. Data broken down by Acute Hospital Trust has not yet been published for Q2 or Q3, but local intelligence suggests that rates are levelling at 17% for both of those quarters.</p> <p>A new targeted intervention has been set up in Houghton Regis to run alongside a maternity clinic, where every woman who smokes will attend a focus group session with the CBC SIP Advisor to gain insight into why women continue to smoke and how the service can be re-designed to support their needs. This includes screening for carbon monoxide and providing positive health messages and information.</p> <p>The referral route for teenage pregnancies (up to under 20s) has been strengthened to ensure those who smoke will now be referred, contacted and supported within the Smokefree Baby and Me Programme. Referrals from this age group have previously been limited and this should increase numbers to the service. Evidence shows that this age group is 6 times more likely to smoke than older mums-to-be. This pathway will be strengthened further through The Family Nurse Partnership which was launched in Central Bedfordshire in March.</p> <p>In 2014/15 (Q1 & Q2) The 'Smokefree Baby and Me' programme achieved a conversion rate of 54.3% - from attending the first appointment to quitting. (Previous conversion rate - prior to the programme - was 32%). In Q1 & Q2 there were a total of 31 referrals, with 16 quits. Of those that set a quit date, 80% (13) were validated quitters.</p>

	Comment	<p>2013/14 data shows that breastfeeding initiation in Central Bedfordshire is better than both the national average (*latest national published data is for 2012/13, due to low data coverage in 2013/14) and the Area Team average, although there has been a slight decrease in Q3 in both hospitals. Work needs to continue on the progression to full Baby Friendly Initiative Accreditation in both Bedford Hospital and Luton and Dunstable Hospital to ensure the skills are in place and support is delivered consistently.</p> <p>Scoping of further integrated working between hospitals, community midwives and Children's Centres is taking place to ensure an early introduction to Children's Centres as a place for support and to ensure effective use of the breastfeeding skills that Children's Centre staff have acquired through training. The proportion of mothers continuing to breast feed at 6-8 weeks has dropped slightly in Q3, as has the proportion of mothers who initiate breastfeeding. This requires effective and strengthening support for mothers from Midwifery Services, Health Visitors and Children's Centres across the antenatal and postnatal pathway. As part of the new Maternity Services Contract for 2015/16, both hospital trusts now have an additional target for breastfeeding rates of 75% @ 5 days. The Health Visiting Service, which now includes 50 wte (whole time equivalent) Health Visitors is now contacting mothers 6 days after delivery (in addition to the 10 days New Birth visit) to offer additional breastfeeding support at an earlier point.</p>
