



Parking Strategy



The Council is working to develop a draft Parking Strategy, a document that sets out how we can provide enough good quality space for parking across Central Bedfordshire. The council would like to hear your views to help shape the Strategy's proposals.

The strategy looks at three key areas and sets out a series of proposed aims for each. These key areas are:

- The quantity of parking spaces in Central Bedfordshire
- The quality of parking spaces in Central Bedfordshire
- Our approach to parking charges and restrictions

Details of these three areas can be found in the consultation paper, and short explanations of them are included within this questionnaire.

Our approach - Quantity

A key aim of the Parking Strategy is ensuring that we have enough parking spaces across the area to meet our needs. With this in mind we propose to assess the parking requirements of each local area, with the following objectives in mind:

- Creating more spaces for short stay and visitor parking to boost the local economy
- Locating commuter parking away from busy areas, including town centres, and encouraging the creation of Park and Rides
- Creating more parking spaces at train stations where this is needed
- Using standards to govern the amount of parking required as part of new developments. These standards will come from the council's Design Guide, which sets out guidelines to ensure new development is of the highest quality
- Ensuring that there is enough space for freight vehicles such as lorries
- Creating more spaces for school traffic, to avoid dangerous parking around school entrances/exits

Our approach - Quality

Whilst we want to create more parking spaces, we also want to ensure that these are good enough to use. Therefore, we propose to improve our car parks with features such as:

- Smarter and electronic payment methods
- Lighting & security controls
- Spaces for motorbikes
- Secure spaces for bicycles
- Electric Vehicle charging points
- Disabled parking bays
- Parent & child bays

We would also seek to create more secure spaces for cycle parking in towns, schools, local centres, health centres and key public transport stops.

In order to ensure that spaces for parking are used effectively we also propose to encourage the use of car clubs, schemes in which residents can hire out a shared pool of cars. We would reserve parking spaces for those using car clubs.

Our approach - Parking control and pricing

In order to ensure parking spaces can be used in a way that benefits everyone, we are proposing to regulate the way they are used. These measures include adjusting the price of parking in certain areas, and also restricting parking where necessary.

Our proposals for regulating the price of parking include:

- Setting higher prices for on-street parking than off-street parking to reduce congestion in the streets
- Considering Sunday parking charges where there is problem with congestion or air quality, or where there is higher demand from shoppers and visitors
- Introducing pay and display for on-street parking where there is congestion or an impact on local residents from parking

Our proposals for restriction and/or regulating parking in certain areas include:

- Limiting long-stay parking in laybys, particularly by lorries, where this causes problems for other road users or local communities
- Increasing regulation around schools where this is needed to improve safety
- Restricting parking and loading in areas where this would be dangerous, such as junctions and busy areas
- Permitting residents of new residential properties or conversions in town centres to purchase a residents permit for use within the town centre long stay car parks where possible
